The Sacramento Archives Crawl is an Archives Month event held every October. 

THE TREES OF MIDTOWN

CORK OAK



Over the years the City of Sacramento has planted several types of oak trees in our local parks and along the streets in midtown. One variety often seen is the cork oak, a medium size evergreen oak that reaches a height and width of 40 to 60 feet and produces acorns about an inch in size. This variety of tree commonly lives for over 200 years.

In addition to making an attractive street tree the cork oak is also interesting in that it is the primary source of cork used for wine bottle stoppers, cork flooring, insulation panels, sound proofing for cars, and other similar products.

A cork oak can be harvested the first time for its cork at about 25 years old and can be re-harvested about 12 times during a tree's lifetime. Harvesting is generally done with human labor, employing about 30,000 people in Europe. The cork oak is native to Southwest Europe and Northwest Africa. Portugal accounts for about 50% of the world's cork. The tree is so important to the economy of Portugal and Spain that they cannot legally be cut down.

Cork oaks are a major plant community of the Mediterranean forests where they support rare animals such as the Barbary Macaque and the Iberian Lynx. The thick insulating bark makes the cork oak well adapted to surviving forest fires. They simply re-grow their branches to fill out the canopy.

To see a couple of very nice specimens of cork oak trees in midtown Sacramento, check out the north east corner of 19th Street and Capitol Avenue.

Downtown Specific Plan Continued ...

As reported in last month's Park Beat, the City of Sacramento has been developing the Downtown Specific Plan (DSP), a document that sets out detailed development standards and uses, infrastructure requirements, and measures to implement the city's General Plan for the entire Central City, not just what is conventionally thought of as "Downtown". The Plan anticipates that new development in the DSP area in the next 20 years would include about 13,400 new housing units, and approximately 7.1 million square feet (sf) of non-residential uses. Most of the new housing units projected in the DSP area are likely to be multifamily units.

The DSP will set the requirements for design and density of infill, which will affect the lives of midtown residents and businesses, both in direct effects on existing properties and more indirect effects, such as traffic generation and sewer capacity. It also provides incentives for developers, including more predictability and streamlined review for their projects, which sometimes means less input by residents.

Although the City held several community stakeholder meetings in spring to get citizen input into the plan, many midtowners did not attend, thinking it only applied to downtown.

There is one more chance for input. The City has issued a Draft Environmental Impact Report (EIR) for the DSP to analyze and disclose potential environmental and social consequences of implementing the proposed DSP. It is now available for public review and comment at the Community Development Department, 300 Richards Boulevard, Third Floor, Sacramento, California 95811, weekdays between 9:00am and 4:00pm. An electronic copy of the document is available for review at the downtown Central Library.

The Draft EIR is being circulated for a 45-day September 22 public review period, November 8, 2017. Written comments regarding the Draft EIR should be received by the Environmental Planning Services no later than 5:00 pm, Wednesday, November 8. Written comments should be submitted to Scott Johnson. Associate Planner: City Community Development Sacramento. Department; Environmental Planning Services; Richards Boulevard, Third Sacramento, CA 95811; or by email at: SRJohnson@cityofsacramento.org

BPNA urges residents to review and comment on the document or, at least those portions of interest or concern to yourself. It is the last chance to determine the development of midtown over the next 20 years.

Locomotive Junction

This month, we begin with an introduction of the principal, the person who has rekindled the spirit and brought an infectious energy to Washington School; Dr. Gema Godina-Martinez.

Dr. Godina-Martinez, is a proud Sacramento native and a product of SCUSD's public schools, including C.K. McClatchy High School where she worked as a teacher and Assistant Principal for 15 years before becoming Principal of Washington Elementary School. She has a Doctorate in Education Leadership & Public Policy, with an emphasis on teacher sustainability. When asked how her education helps her with her current position, Dr Godina-Martinez states, "Teacher sustainability at Washington means building a strong community and school culture that is evident in each classroom and with our staff as a whole. I am really proud of the sense of community we've built this past year, and I look forward to growing and nurturing it in the coming academic year. When I think about the goals for our school and our ideal promotional graduate, building a strong school culture that is sustainable even once I or any of our staff, moves on, is key. I want the school to grow and remain strong. In other words, we're building a Washington School for students that may not even be born yet, in addition to the students who are enrolled currently. This is a long-term goal for our neighborhood school -- five, ten, or fifteen years down the road. We lead, we innovate, we empower, and we care."

Dr. Godina-Martinez is not just an educator who cares, she is also a parent. She states, "One of my greatest joys is having had the opportunity to help build our STEAM school and to have my 9 year old daughter attend."

Plant for the Planet Academy: At this Academy, 4th–12th graders learn about the science of climate change from other young Ambassadors. Parents are invited to participate in a separate workshop in the morning, and return in the afternoon to hear the children's presentations. In addition, local VIPs will be invited to come and listen to the presentations.

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
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WALKING THE NEIGHBORHOOD: FINDING SMALL TREATS
